Latest News

Since the start of June, thirty-eight students have been working onsite taking part in their remote lessons from the main hall. To provide a break from technology, students and staff have also enjoyed a variety of lunchtime activities, including face shield production for local care homes. A highlight has been the weekly Friday (socially distanced) lunchtime quiz, in which the teachers are currently reigning champions.

Alongside the academic support on offer for students, both remotely and onsite, the LAE Tottenham COVID appeal has raised money allowing weekly payments to be made to over 200 families to support living costs at such a difficult time. These payments have totalled £56,000 and thanks to the generosity of donors can now continue through the summer holiday period. These payments (of £15 a week in most cases) make a significant difference to our most disadvantaged students and ensure that the pandemic does not further widen educational inequality. In addition to these weekly payments, LAE Tottenham has also supported several families with specific hardship payments totaling almost £5,000 and made donations of £14,500 to local food banks. Whilst LAE Tottenham is *the place for academic rigour*, equally important is our sense of social responsibility and we are proud of the way that our community has come together to support those most in need.







UCAS Workshop Sessions

On Wednesday 3rd June, Year 12 students were off timetabled lessons for a UCAS day. Students participated in a number of sessions, receiving university insights via staff videos, setting up their UCAS accounts and following advice on how to select and shortlist different courses. A highlight of the day was the student-led remote workshops. Current Year 13 students shared their experiences through question and answer sessions which were offered across eleven different subject areas. Optional interactive workshops were also held on applications to Oxbridge, pathways to medicine and International Applications.

By the end of the day, students had registered their UCAS accounts, made an initial shortlist of courses and set an action plan for further preparations. All students have now been assigned a UCAS academic referee to guide them through this process. It was inspiring to see what could be achieved in spite of the limitations posed by COVID-19 and we have learned many lessons about how technology can be utilised to provide our students with university-related opportunities in the future.

Online Taster Days at LAET

On Monday 29 June and Tuesday 30 June, our 900 offer holders signed up to take part in the first ever remote taster days. Sessions on these days gave students an insight into their chosen A Level subjects and support with completion of the comprehensive bridging work provided for all offer holders. In addition to subject tasters, offer holders were offered a range of optional sessions such as 'Pastoral Care at LAET', 'Oxbridge applications' and 'US universities'. Despite the logistical challenges of remote taster days, we're delighted that offer holders got a sense of what studying at LAET will be like.

Library 'Click & Collect'

This term our library has offered a 'click and collect' service where students have been able to access the catalogue and reserve books to collect from reception. The requests have come in thick and fast with around 150 students tapping into this opportunity already. Students are able to access subject reading lists via the catalogue and request items that will help them go beyond the curriculum in preparation for their university applications. They can also leave reviews and request new titles not currently in stock. A few of our Tottenham Ten have proved very popular. The extent to which the students have seized this opportunity has been incredibly impressive. We have also developed a reading list about racism to support students and staff to deepen their knowledge of issues regarding race. This list is not exhaustive but is a great start for everyone looking to further their understanding of these complex issues.
